## Participating as an invited delegate at Pope Francis's Apostolic visit to Papua New Guinea from 7<sup>th</sup> September till 9<sup>th</sup> September 2024





When the invitation came from The Catholic Bishops Conference of Papua New Guinea and Solomons Islands to all leaders and persons of responsibility for their organisation through CRA (Catholic Religious Australia) in early June 2024, I did not hesitate to accept this once in a life-time invitation to be present for Pope Francis's apostolic visit to Papua New Guinea from 7th September till 9th September 2024

The journey from Western Australia to Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea itself took over nearly 8 hours from Perth, transiting in Brisbane after an overnight flight of 4 and a half hours from Perth. It took another three and a half hours from Brisbane to Port Moresby. The journey was worth it. PNG's relations with Australia goes back to the colonial administration era from 1949 to its proclamation of political independence on 16 September 1975. Our geographical proximity, cultural connections and people-to-people links goes back to prehistorical times. The battle against the Japanese Imperial Army during the Second World War (WWW II) also forged close bonds between the two countries.<sup>1</sup>

I was told the whole of PNG was already excited ever since they knew Pope Francis would come all the way for this visit in September. It was a sign of 'hope' for them. One MSC (Missionary of Sacred Heart)'s priest related to me that people living in the rural areas of PNG had walked many weeks to Port Moresby, crossing jungles and terrains by foot just to get a glimpse to see Pope Francis.

As invited guests, we were allowed to attend three main events. The first event was His Holiness meeting with consecrated women and men, lay catechists, seminarians, bishops, archbishops from PNG and Oceania (14 countries including Australia). The second event was the Papal Mass on Sunday with everyone at Sir John Guise stadium. That is the third event we were invited to attend was the meeting of His holiness with the young people, whom he always attributes them as the hope of the future.
